# END OF WARS DEPENDS UPON READING BOOKS

## All Classes Are Served by New Institution, Speaker Says.

War and crime, the greatest problems of modern civilization, can be ended through development of the individual's understanding of the other fellow's perplexities and this understanding is best promoted through reading. This statement was the keynote of the principal address delivered at the dedication this afternoon of Creston's new public library by Frank Miles, Des Moines, editor of the Iowa Legion-

naire and widely known public speaker.

The program was given in the new institution known as the Matilda J. Gibson memorial library in honor of a pioneer Creston resident. The building was made possible by a \$35,000 gift from Mrs. Frank Phillips of Bartlesville, Okla., daughter of Mrs. Gibson.

### Many In Attendance.

Before a crowd which filled the main floor of the library, Mr. Miles stressed his contention that all should have a reading course or reading material in order that they may round out their education and thereby obtain a comprehensive view of mutual problems. A public library, such as that just completed

# READ BOOKS TO END WARS

in Creston, provides the means of knowledge for the masses, poor and rich alike, he declared.

"All cannot have college education," the well-known legion leader explained, "but all living in communities big enough to support public libraries have the opportunity of keeping informed on local, state, national and world affairs and they should avail themselves of that opportunity if they desire better citizenship, national pride, less crime and world peace. Through reading, all of us may keep well informed and that means the mutual understanding of individuals and nations which maintains peace."

Mr. Miles firmly denied charges that he is a militarist and declared he approved any reasonable plan to bring nations together for conferences on difficulties to prevent war.

State Librarian Here.  
Preceding Mr. Miles on the program was Johnson Brigham, Des Moines, state librarian. Before the principal talks were given, music was furnished by an orchestra directed by Charles A. Hayden, and by Mr. and Mrs. Willis Boyce, who sang a duet number. Invocation was said by Rev. M. Kallihar, assistant pastor of Immaculate Conception church. Following the address by the Legionnaire editor, a solo was sung by Mrs. H. J. Trusty.

The library was formally presented the city by Homer Harsh, president of the board, and the speech of acceptance was given by Mayor S. Ray Emerson. A piano solo by Miss Evelyn Hessel and benediction by Rev. James R. E. Craighhead, pastor of the Presbyterian church, closed the dedication program.

A dance and card party for which tickets will be required will be given in the building tonight, beginning at 8 o'clock. All profits of the party will be used to buy books and equipment.

To Move Books.  
Both the old library in the junior high school and the new building will be closed while books are transferred from one to the other.

When the new library is opened, the following hours will be observed: From 2 to 6 every afternoon except Mondays and Sundays and from 7 to 9 on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday nights. Miss Belle Alderson has been appointed librarian.
